

### **COVID-19 UPDATE**

March 31, 2020

There are no new positive test results reported as of 2:30 PM March 31, 2020. The total confirmed case count in Okanagan County is still three.

### **Guidance for In-Home Care Providers and Their Clients**

#### **In-Home Care PROVIDERS**

In-Home Care Providers provide direct care to older adults and adults with disabilities who may be at greater risk for serious COVID-19 complications. By monitoring your client's health and taking precautions to protect both you and your client, you can reduce the risk for infection and identify any unusual symptoms early.

- If you are sick, do not work. Self-monitor for symptoms, including:
  - o Fever above 100.4
  - Cough
  - Shortness of breath

Take your temperature each day before going to work, if you have a fever over 100.4, do not go to work.

- Provide services remotely when possible. Examples include phone calls for eating reminders and meal preparation outside of clients home.
- Call ahead to ask clients if they are experiencing any symptoms. If they are, urge them to reach out to their doctor for further instructions
- If your client is sick, and you cannot perform your tasks remotely, take protective precautions, including:
  - Monitor your client for worsening symptoms.
  - Wash your hands with soap and water for at least 20 seconds regularly.
  - Avoid touching your nose, eyes, and mouth with unwashed hands
  - Your client should wear a face mask while you are providing care. If they are not able to, you, as the caregiver, should wear a face mask.
  - Wear gloves when having contact with the clients fluids and clean your hands immediately afterwards.
  - o Avoid sharing household items with the client.
  - o Disinfect common areas frequently and wash used laundry thoroughly.

#### In-Home Care CLIENTS

As an In-Home Care client, you may have concerns about your caregivers coming into your homes during this time and feel helpless. There are a couple of things you can do to help protect yourself as well as your caregiver.

- Ask your caregiver prior to them entering your home if they have taken their temperature that day and if they have had any symptoms, including: Fever above 100.4, Cough, or Shortness of breath. If your caregiver has any of these symptoms ask them to arrange for an alternate caregiver.
- If you have any symptoms, such as fever, cough, or new or worsening shortness of breath, alert your caregiver prior them coming into your home. Call your doctor for further instructions.
